## **CULS 5215 MA Research Paper**

#### **Course Description:**

This is an elective course of the MA in Intercultural Studies program. Students enrolling in this course will have the opportunity to conduct individual research on a selected topic in the field of Cultural Studies. Students are encouraged to extend theories and knowledge they learned from other courses when writing the research paper.

Students are expected to engage in tutorial discussions and comment on each other's writings throughout the term. They will need to meet with the instructor regularly to develop their ideas and frameworks for their paper.

## **Learning Outcomes:**

Upon completion of this course, students should be able to:

- design and execute an academic research project independently,
- demonstrate a critical understanding of the relevant literature,
- analyse cultural texts or phenomena using relevant cultural theories and methods, and
- make original contributions to an area of research in Cultural Studies.

#### Coursework:

- Students interested in this course will join a Zoom meeting with the course instructor on <u>4 November 2023 (Saturday)</u>. During the meeting, students will be informed of course expectations.
- To be considered for this course, students will have to submit a two-page proposal (approx. 1000 words) by <u>17 November 2023 (Friday, 23:59)</u> for shortlisting. Notification about enrolment will be sent out on or before 27 November 2023.
- After the Add/Drop period, students will submit an extended, five-page proposal (approx. 2000 words) in <u>Week 3 (in class)</u> with a focus on the significance of the study, a review of related literature, detailed research plan, and a bibliography. They will receive written comments from the course instructor before conducting the research.
- The class will be divided into groups for tutorial after the first three seminars. For progress report and final review sessions, students are expected to do short presentations on their writing drafts, and we will open the floor for discussion and consultation.
- The writing drafts MUST be provided to the course instructor and fellow classmates before the sessions. Students are expected to read their classmates' drafts and give constructive comments during the tutorials.
- Students are encouraged to arrange individual consultations with the course instructor between January and April of 2023 when needed.
- The completed research paper is due on <u>30 April (Sunday, 23:59)</u>. Please submit the paper to both VeriGuide and Blackboard. The maximum word limit of the paper is 12,000 words (in English) and 20,000 words (in Chinese). Tables, diagrams (including associated legends), appendices, references, footnotes and endnotes, and the bibliography are excluded from the word count.

- 60% Research Paper

# **Grading Rubric:**

Grade	Description
A	Outstanding performance on all learning outcomes. The paper greatly exceeds the course expectations, and displays exceptional standards of scholarship and originality.
A-	Generally outstanding performance on all (or almost all) learning outcomes. The paper exceeds the course expectations. The student demonstrates evidence of extensive research and reading related to the project. The paper is well-structured and comprehensible.
В	The paper meets the course expectations. The student demonstrates the ability to locate research gaps, formulate research questions, collect data,

	analyse materials critically, and incorporate relevant readings in the paper.  The paper is written clearly and comprehensible.

#### **Research Ethics:**

It is paramount for students to conduct their research ethically and respectfully. Students are strongly suggested to familiarise themselves with the University's guidelines on research ethics and complete the online research training on 'Publication Ethics'. Students conducting research that involves surveys and observation of human behaviour should also complete the online research training on 'Survey and Behavioural Research Ethics'. Besides the ethical considerations arising from research operations, students should be critically aware of their subject positions when proposing research questions and designs. They should also reflect constantly on the researcher-researched relationships.

The craft of research is an accessible guidebook for one to design research projects. We will cover most of the book's content during the first three seminars. Reading this book to deepen your understanding of academic-style research is highly recommended.

Gray, A. (2003). Research practice for cultural studies: ethnographic methods and lived cultures. SAGE.

Both books discuss research designs and methodological issues specific to qualitative research and cultural studies (as a broad field). Instead of providing sets of standard procedures to follow, both books help students to reflect on their attitudes to research methods, and offer practical tips on doing interviews and ethnography.
